Today's worship:

In the light of the recent NATO gathering and Environmental Summit held in Madrid, the focus of the world media looked to the vexed issues of world peace, security and sustainability. Partly as our world is so reliant on the market forces that can vary and impact on us so quickly (a quick look at fuel prices illustrates this perfectly) the message of today's Gospel is something that we could consider as a reminder to us of the need of making sure our own house is in order. "The axe is already laying at the base of the trees" warns the Baptist, and "the winnowing fork is in his hand." (Matthew 3:1-12). The call of the one crying in the wilderness is to transform not only our lives but our world view that is in accord with the teaching that Jesus was to bring. We are to make our paths straight, and not hinder the coming of the kingdom. This is why Advent is considered penitential as well as expectant. We are called to make changes so that we can welcome the reign of Jesus into our lives.


### We begin our praise



### From the Christmas Bowl Appeal:

The third week of Advent is the week of joy. Joy is different to happiness. The word happiness shares its origins with the word happenstance. We are happy because of things that happen to us, our circumstances or context affects our condition. Joy is the opposite. Joy arises from a place within. In the case of joy, it is our condition that affects our context. Imagine the scandalous story of Mary and Joseph, an unwed mother giving birth to a child whose father was not her betrothed! In spite of the fear and shame associated with such an event, there is also much joy: the joy of the miracle of birth, the joy of the miracle of love, the joy of 'God with us.' And it is the joy of Jesus' arrival that becomes a polemic to the shame of the circumstances surrounding his birth. Joy changes our circumstances. True joy confronts, re-interprets, and reshapes our context. Or as Isaiah so beautifully imagines, there will be 'streams in the desert' (35:6) and the way of joy will make 'sorrow and sighing flee away' (35:10). Christians believe that joy is a fruit of the Holy Spirit – in other words, joy grows within us as the Holy Spirit is at work in our lives. What joy are you experiencing in your life that confronts your notions of conformity? What joy do you see around you that challenges your previous assumptions? What opportunities do you have to share this joy with others?



John the Baptist quotes the prophecy of Isaiah: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight'. How can we prepare the way of the Lord this Advent? As Isaiah tells us, by proclaiming (in deed and in word) good news to the poor, freedom for the prisoners, recovery of sight for the blind, freedom for the oppressed and the year of the Lord's favour.

- Pray this week for the chance to proclaim to others the fullness of life that Jesus offers the world.
- Give thanks for the work and witness of the Nippon Sei Ko Kai, the Anglican Church of Japan.
