Today's worship:

"Australia Day", as a public holiday, commenced only in 1988 during the bicentennial celebrations. I look back with awe at the parade of Tall Ships leaving the Derwent Estuary a few days before – sadly few were under sail due to the prevailing wind, but it was an impressive sight.

For some in Australia, this is not a day of celebration but a time to recall that many generations of nations were wiped out as a result of interaction with the settlement, whether by violence or disease.

Today, we walk a tightrope in the Church's calendar. Do we keep the day or ignore it? Can we both acknowledge where we are at presently but also lament on what has been? Are we mature enough to look forward but acknowledge the past?

There was so much opposition to the *Apology to the Stolen Generations* in 2008. It was based on a fear of 'opening the floodgates of litigation.' What it did was move reconciliation and healing forward.

Today, we acknowledge the three great peoples whose boundaries intersect in our world: Dja Dja Wurrung, Taunguraung and Wurendjeri. We acknowledge their elders, past, present and emerging. We meet in peace.
