Today's worship:

Debates aside as to when to hold this feast, the Sunday before Lent brings the season of Light, Epiphany, to close with the transfiguration of the Lord. Many arguments out there in the Church ether will insist that it should be commemorated on August 6th. With the memory of the end of WWII in mind, August 6 was a day that unleashed another light that led to the death of 800,000+ instantly. Justified by the ethical argument of *proportionalism* (one act of evil in the common good is better than no action).

The Season of Light, Epiphany, in contrast, is not about judgment but rather the presence of the Light of God (to lighten the Gentiles) coming to do for us what was required. Jesus, in talking with Moses and Elijah, confirms that his ministry would be fulfilled in the offering of himself on the cross. To overcome the power of sin, death must be conquered. This is the pivotal moment that sharpens the Messianic mission to that which leads to new life.

What better time to remember that Jesus is the light of the world than mid-summer?

Homily

Affirmation of Faith

As we continue the Epiphany season, we say together our Baptismal Creed, the Apostles Creed.

There are some days that will be a structured program, and they will be advertised in advance.

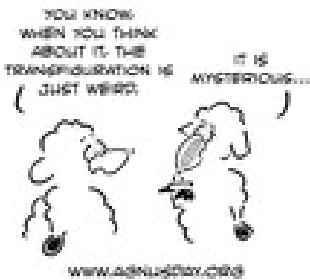
Next Thursday Church of the Resurrection will be open for quiet on the first day after Ash Wednesday.
